





When she loses both her job and the man who she thought was the one, she impulsively decides to move to Limoges. But she's not going there to change her life. She heard it was a sad town and so she moves there set on committing suicide. There she meets Tiziana, a blind old Italian woman who takes her under her wing. She also meets Hémon, a young teacher with old school charm who makes her confront a form of otherness she never experienced before. Her sister, Camille, a young mother, comes to visit her at one point. Her outlook is so different that it shakes the walls Anaïs carefully built between herself and the world... In an intimate and moving novel with different portraits of women, Pauline Harmange subtly addresses some hard topics like depression, illness, motherhood and manages to instill the narrative with light and hope.

When travelling through a desert landscape, she remembers her daily life in the camp, and the deep sisterhood built with the other prisoners in the face of adversity. This novel, with its mysterious dreamlike atmosphere, questions the boundary between memory and imagination, dream and reality, and echoes events that have marked the author, as well as the world, such as the Holocaust and the 2004 tsunami that hit India, where she lives part of the year.







La Retenue is the result of a woman's long healing process, a woman who found the strength to break the silence around incest that every survivor is confronted with. Her family members perpetuated this silence and threatened to destroy her vital psychological resources at any moment, when she was a child, a teenager and even a woman.

With a lucid courage and an incisive style, Corinne Grandemange talks about the multiple sexual abuses and rapes committed by her uncle, in the deafening silence of the adults. She managed to deconstruct the mental prison that survivors are put into and, after going through therapy, she retrained to work for child protection and actively fight against incest. Since incest is secretly present in every aspect of our society, stories like this one pave the way for a collective reflection that is absolutely necessary.


La malcastrée The Illcastrated

In the early 1970s, the psychiatric institution was sometimes extremely violent. This is what the narrator, extremely close to the author, describes. While she is in charge of tying children with Down's syndrome to their seats all day, she decides to rebel and unties them all, thus allowing them to move freely. She goes through painful moments caused by the mistreatment of the institution, alone: the author describes, in this testimony full of rage, the chemical treatments, the forced abortions, the prohibition to write, the loss of the loved one. Until she is expelled — an event paradoxically painful and liberating at the same time.





Emma Santos (1946-1983) is an author who has devoted much of her work to writing about illness. In 1976, she became known thanks to the mass-market edition of *La Malcastrée* by Éditions des femmes.






Là où le feu et l'ours - Where the Fire and the Bear by Corinne Morel Darleux




L'odeur d'un père - A Father's Scent

A reconciliation book as well as a "Letter to my father", this narrative sheds a retrospective and human look on a paternal figure, without sparing its more brutal aspects.


Les désossés To The Bone




François d'Epenoux published about ten books at éditions Anne Carrière, two of which were adapted for the screen.



These tales and many more can be discovered in this collection... Here, princesses are not pale, passive or waiting to be saved. Sometimes they are even cruel, princes are helpless and children desperate. And when love triumphs, it is not where you would expect it.

These tales are feminist, modern, even radical but also dark and troubling. And if you encounter Blue Beard, the Little Mermaid or Rapunzel, they have shed their old skins and are ready to lead you on more subversive paths.

Les Enragé es is the second book published in the collection "Les Martiales" that aims at bringing powerful unheard voices into the publishing world!





He ran after us. We were scared. He had been shot in the head with a stray bullet. The school had been closed for a week. Hailed by the critics when it first appeared in Quebec, this collection of wild news stories immerses us in a world peopled by sombre and grotesques characters, A new voice, undisciplined and mixed, calling to mind at times Marie Vieux-Chauvet or Hilda Hilst, Pascale Bernardin alternately explores madness and violence, childhood and social class, memory and Haiti's roots.

Poissons rouges et autres bêtes aussi féroces is a collection of novellas presented in the form of a bestiary in which fantastic elements help decipher secret urges and obscure corners of the human heart. In this other world that opens its doors, we actually explore this world, penetrated by ferocious conflicts: rich and powerful vs. poor, man vs. woman, child vs. adult, racism, wars. This book is a dizzying dive into a literature of the bizarre where reality and fantasy intertwine lifted by a subtle and mastered writing style.


Ses yeux d'eau Her Water-Colored Eyes
